

CONCERNING GROOMS IN THE LOS ANGELES DEATHS OF TWO TEEN-AGE RELIGIOUS OUTLISTS.

The Los Angeles Times today reported police are investigating possible links between the Tate slayings and the deaths of a dope peddler, a motorcyclist in Bishop, Calif., and a member of the Manson clan in suburban Venice. No details were reported.

With a court ban on comment imposed on officials, deputies continued scouring the movie ranch.

The ranch's owner, George C. Spahn, 80, said Manson and O'Shea had argued before O'Shea disappeared. The cult had lived on his ranch for a time, Spahn said, against his will.

Prosecutors announced yesterday they will seek a single trial for Manson and the five members of his desert tribe charged with murder and conspiracy in the deaths of Miss Tate and six others.

One of the defendants, Susan Atkins, also is charged in the murder of Gary Hinman, musician, in Malibu, Calif.

The prosecutors say they expect the defendants will seek separate trials and will try to sever the case of the August slayings of the honey-blonde actress and four others killed on her estate and from those of wealthy market owner Leno LaBlanca and his wife, killed the next day.

Two deputy district attorneys, Aaron Stovitz and Vincent Bugliosi, made their comments in an interview.

Belief on Link

"We will attempt to try them together," Bugliosi said of the six defendants, "and we will try to have them tried at the same time for the Tate and LaBlanca killings. We feel a common thread runs through both cases."

"The defense will probably move to sever each defendant from the others and sever the Tate case from the LaBlanca case. We are going to resist that."

Susan Atkins, 21, Linda Kasabian, 20, and Leslie Louise Van Houten, 19, were impassive in the court proceedings. December 16 was set for a plea of guilty or innocent for Miss Atkins and December 22 for Miss Van Houten and Mrs. Kasabian. Miss Van Houten gave the alias Leslie Sankston when arrested and was indicted under that name.

Others charged, besides Manson, are Patricia Krenwinkel, 22, held in Mobile, Ala., and Charles Watson, 24, held in McKinney, Tex.

Bugliosi said Miss Van Houten might have to be tried alone because she is charged with murder only in the LaBlanca killings.

Ian Anderson, lead flutist (what?) of Jethro Tull, babbled wildly and leaped at the microphone, his eyes rolling madly.

What is this, a put-on? Perhaps. Yet Jethro Tull (a 4-man group) is a prime example of some of the imaginative deviations from the main stream of rock music now taking place.

More and more there is noticeable a trend to the bizarre, embracing experimental sound techniques and showing a distinct desire — brace yourself — to return to showmanship.

Quite apart from the expressionless, seemingly non-emotional, behavior on stage most groups employed, a newer wave of performers are aware of their stage presence and visual impact and have made their marks. Robert Plant of the Led Zeppelin "directs" his group with dance-like gestures. The Hello People appear as a mime troupe.

And then there is Jethro Tull. Dressed in what looks like a late Eighteenth century waistcoat, Anderson hops about uninhibitedly cackling and making grotesque expressions.

While playing the flute (with the mouthpiece practically touching the microphone) he makes vocal noises, the combination of which sounds as if he's playing an electric kazoo. "A New Day Yesterday," a number using a recurring predominant theme, was most enjoyable.

Anderson bolstered the act with a witty monologue and was helped when what sounded like a police band cut in on the speaker at stage right, mumbling something about picking up some kids at a taco stand.

"Extraordinary," said Anderson, "A renegade policeman." Jethro Tull. Very strange. Somewhere between Dadaism and comic-opera in a state of madness.

Joe Cocker and the Grease Band also were effective. Cocker, whose movements can best be described as controlled-spastic, does in a baritone range what Janis Joplin does with shrill notes—somewhat of a growl—but not quite a shout.

The honey-gravel sound of "The Letter" was amazing. "Delta Lady" was vintage bayou-rock, and The Beatles "Something" (from the "Abbey Road" album) was well handled. The Grease back Cocker well; they don't detract.

Fleetwood Mac also played before a moderately small wintery-night crowd at Memorial Hall, Kansas City, Kansas. The show was produced by New Sound Projections. I'll say.

Baldness Is Not So Bad, Doctor Says

London (AP)—Relax, baldie. Those thinning locks do not indicate loss of virility.

That's the word from Focus, magazine of the Consumer Council, a British government agency.

According to a dermatologist quoted by the magazine, balding indicates that everything is normal.

But worry about baldness is a different matter.

"I get a lot of young men coming to see me," the dermatologist says. "It is, in its own way, a tragic procession. Many of them are pathetic. They come to tell me they fear they are growing bald. Many of them have become neurotic about it. They tell me they have failed in life; failed with girls; failed with jobs. They believe their baldness is the cause of their failure."

He says: "People who are going bald should not rush off for a wig or a hairpiece." They should first see their doctor, or if necessary a dermatologist, who will tell them if they have the common male type of baldness or a reversible type.

A JUDGE IS INDICTED

New Jersey Official Accused of Offering Bribes

Trenton, N. J. (AP)—A county court judge accused of offering a prosecutor "10 big ones" to influence a bribery and bookmaking case today pleaded innocent at his arraignment after surrendering to police.

Ralph DeVita, Union County court judge, suspended by the state supreme court Tuesday after a hearing, has been indicted by a grand jury that has been investigating organized crime as its primary function.

Peter R. Richards and Edwin H. Stier, co-directors of a state task force investigating organized crime, said DeVita had offered "10 big ones" to Michael R. Imbriani, Somerset County prosecutor. They said they interpreted the "10 big ones" to mean \$10,000.

Stier and Richards said DeVita had interceded with Imbriani on behalf of three persons charged in Somerset with bribery and bookmaking.
